EARLY DAYS

Percival Hadlow Buxton and his wife Ada open the first shop in 1919 at 31 DitchIng Road, Brighton

1919

PRAMS

In the 1920's a second shop is opened and Percival begins selling prams, cots and toys.

1925

2ND GENERATION OF FAMILY JOIN

Percy and Ada buy the premises on either side of the existing shop in Ditchling Road and sons Norman & Roy join the business.

FIRST MAJOR EXPANSION

Normans' sons Peter and Roger join the business in the mid 1960's. Buxtons becomes one of Brighton's most modern businesses, with shops in London Road & Ditching Road Brighton, Crawley and Shoreham.

EXPANDED CARPETS AND CURTAINS

Buxtons sell their last pram in Sept 1993. A new carpet and curtain department opens in the new 6,000 sq ft store in Ditchling Road. A 4th Generation join the business, Scott Buxton (1997) Damian Buxton (2002).

MOVE TO WOODINGDEAN

Carpets and commercial flooring move to new premises at Woodingdean and a smaller interior and furnishings store opens at 35 Ditchling Rd.



PERCIVAL HADLOW BUXTON

Born in 1894, ex-sailor Percival Hadlow Buxton and his wife Ada opened the first Buxtons shop at 31 Ditchling Road, Brighton in 1919.

They borrowed £15 as working capital to start the business. The couple visited auction sales to pick up furniture bargains, which they washed and polished to display in the bay window and sell in the shop.

Percival used to hire a handcart for 4 pence a day to make the deliveries up and down the hilly streets of Brighton.

When they first began to sell new furniture it was possible to furnish a complete home for £30. Bedstead, complete dining room and lounge suite, kitchen table & chairs, lino and 2 rugs would all be within budget. Percy would also lay the lino for free.



31 DITCHLING ROAD

Percy and Ada lived above the shop for many years and both sons were born there; Norman in 1920 and Roy in 1922. There were gardens and stables at the rear of the old shop.

SUCCESSFUL EXPANSION

Percival opened more shops in Richmond Place and so began the Buxton reputation for selling quality prams, cots and toys. For a while the Buxtons shops in Waterloo Place and Kensington Gardens were the only 2 pram shops in Brighton.



SALES LEDGER

1935 - 1946
Buxtons started their own hire purchase scheme.
Customers came into the shop regularly to pay off small amounts and new customers gave information about their employment.

BABY

PRAMS

For several years Buxtons was the only shop in Brighton selling prams. Many generations of a family would use a Buxton's pram.

1930's

UTILITY FURNITURE

A collection of catalogues from the 40's and 50's shows Harris Lebus Furniture in Tottenham, London advertised as one of the largest furniture factories in the world.

Buxtons sold much of the so called 'utility furniture' from these catalogues, with a typical three piece suite selling for around £42.00.

Flooring mainly consisted of linoleum, which would be loose laid and then trimmed back to fit 6 weeks later. Carpets were thin on the ground in the 1950's, made mostly of wool and just used as stair carpet.

20 YEARS TOWN SERVICE

Percival still found time to serve the town in which he had lived for 50 years. In 1950, he was elected to Brighton Council as a Conservative representative for Pier Ward. In 1967, he was made an Alderman, with an opportunity to serve the people of the town where he lived and prospered.

PALM TREES FOR BRIGHTON

Whilst serving on the Parks and Gardens committee he was instrumental in getting Palm Trees at the Royal Pavilion.

1961, THE BUSINESS EXPANDS

In 1960, the existing admin office was very small, with only 2 phone lines, all ledgers were hand written and at the end of each day cash was taken and stored overnight in the bank's safe deposit box.

Steady growth had made the directors well aware that they needed to expand the office and the store itself.

1960's

To facilitate this expansion, the Directors agreed that it would be necessary to rebuild and modernise the store to help them plan for a growing business for both now and in the future.

In the late 50's, Buxtons had several shops trading in Sussex:


- London Rd, Brighton prams, nursery furniture & toys
- · DitchIng Rd, Brighton furniture
- Crawley (right) prams, toys & cycles
- Shoreham cycles, mopeds, tous and prams.

Roy's son, Barry, helped out at the Shoreham store, bringing cash back to Brighton on the train.




BUXTONS

After the rebuild, Buxtons announce that the new store has enabled them to be the only firm in this field to offer the latest method of visual exhibit and display. The special layout enables a customer to walk around the store to view and select purchases in their own time but with an assistant on hand if needed.





1969 - GOLDEN JUBILEE

To celebrate their Golden Jubilee, Buxtons launched a special celebration fortnight with prizes for every 50th customer to enter the shop. Other prizes were a pair of wing fireside chairs or a divan mattress set for the customer that could produce the earliest dated receipt made out by Buxtons.

Percival Buxton said in a newspaper article "Today Buxtons is still a family business serving 3rd generation customers with our courteous service, good quality and reasonable prices. These principles have proved to be the back-bone of the business throughout it's 50 years in the town."





Brothers Peter and Roger joined the business in 1965 and 1966 respectively. They were Managing Directors through till 2016 when they retired.

THE PAVILION LONG GALLERY

During the 1970s, Buxtons started a number of interesting contracts at the Royal Pavilion, Brighton. The first contract was for fitting a unique carpet in the Long Gallery, joining the Music Room and Banqueting Room.

The Wilton Royal carpet was specially designed and woven in the colours and pattern replicating the original 1822 Nash print hanging in the Pavilion.

The plain green carpet for the central strip was reserved for the public walkway. Each 194ft seam took 6 hours to sew by hand with linen thread. The contract was completed in the summer of 1975.

PARKING

As parking started to become a problem in Brighton, derelict houses were demolished in Oxford Place making a new car park available for customers and directors.

Later in the 1990's when parking at Ditchling Road became even more difficult, Buxtons offered customers complimentary vouchers for off street parking.

OPEN ALL HOURS

One of their most popular and successful sales events was the Buxtons 'cheese and wine' evenings which enabled customers to browse and choose products at their leisure. They also introduced 6 day opening to fit in with customers growing busy lifestyles.

FREE FITTING

With growing competition from other retailers, Buxtons offered customers free credit and also free carpet fitting to help them keep ahead of their competitors.

In the 1970's, Buxtons closed the Crawley and Shoreham shops, and the prams and toys department in London Road moved into the corner development on Ditchling Road.

THE ROYAL PAVILION

Music Room and gallery bespoke Wilton carpet.

1980 GOODWOOD HOUSE

Sanding of wood block floors at Goodwood House. Lord and Lady March invited all operatives working on the project to a banquet in the main dining room. It was reported to be a very grand affair, with Royal Silver Service.

1982 DOME THEATRE

Re-carpeted the Dome Theatre. The Buxtons carpet fitters had the challenge of fitting the flooring around the unique curved auditorium. Contracts for many new blocks of flats in Brighton were sold with Buxtons carpets included in the price. Colour was chosen by the buyer.

75YRS CELEBRATION PRAMS OUT - CARPETS IN

Oct 1993 - changing with the times, Buxtons closed the prams side of the business and opened a new carpet and curtain department in the 6,000 sq ft store. This gave them more space, better opportunities for display and a relaxed environment where customers could browse through samples and take time to consider their purchase.

With commercial work accounting for 3 times the retail business. The directors took the decision to open a contracts office on the first floor. The formal opening coincided with the 75th year celebration.

1990's

ROYAL ALEXANDRA HOSPITAL FOR SICK CHILDREN, BRIGHTON

In 1992, Buxtons were contracted to lay the flooring at the 'Alex'. A competition was held to add a design to the floor of the hospital. The competition was won by Marc Blackman from Lewes. [pictured here] with his winning design and Brian Wilcox from NHS Trust and on the right Buxton's joint Managing Director, Roger Buxton.



80TH Anniversary

To celebrate their 80th Anniversary Buxtons turned back the clock and organised a 1920's style reception at the shop complete with vintage car and 'flapper girls' Jean de Fuszard, PA to Roger Buxton and Gabrielle Buxton, daughter of Peter Buxton.



2,000 SQ METRES OF FLOORING Buxtons awarded a contract to replace floor covering at the Brighton Conference Centre. 'HAIR RAISING' INSTALLATION AT THE PAVILION For one fitting at the Royal Pavilion Brighton, Buxtons had to use a crane to lift rolls of carpet onto the first floor, taking great care not to hit the tall minarets on the Royal Palace!

2006 MOVE TO WOODINGDEAN

With the contracts flooring division regularly undertaking work for many institutions throughout Sussex including universities, schools and hospitals. The decision was made in 2006 to move out of the premises that had been their home for 85 years, retaining the furniture, upholstery and gift-ware store at 35 Ditchling Road and relocate to the impressive newly built Woodingdean Business Park.

The move which would clearly benefit the operations of the business giving them modern warehousing and office facilities and excellent transportation and delivery links to and from the A23 and A27. The new Woodingdean site would also give them the opportunity to set up a new domestic flooring and carpet showroom.

Damian Buxton said: "Percival Buxton my Great Grandfather who with his entrepreneurial attitude was always looking for opportunities to move the business forward and to change with the times. He would I'm sure have agreed with the reasoning behind the move, but he would also want to know the Buxton's ethos of providing quality and service will continue."

THE 2ND GENERATION OF FOUNDERS OF THE BUSINESS SADLY PASSED AWAY

In 2011 - Roy Hadlow Buxton died and then in 2013 his brother Norman Percival Buxton passed away.


THE ROYAL PAVILION, A RICH HISTORY

The Royal Pavilion holds a rich history originally built as a seaside retreat for the then Prince Regent.

In 1850, Queen Victoria decided to sell the Royal Pavilion to the town of Brighton. All the furniture, fittings and carpets were to be transported to Buckingham Palace to be used by the Queen and her household. It was decided that the original Axminster carpet (designed by Thomas Willy in 1822) was not needed and it was de-constructed to make rugs for the Royal London residence.

Restoration work began on the saloon in January 2014 to produce an authentic replica of the carpet. Decorative artist and glass conservator, Anne Sowden, used the one fragile portion of the carpet to create an intricate line drawn and painted design.

Anne worked closely with Axminster carpets who made the original 195 years ago. It took 7 months to complete the work which was laborious and time consuming. It was also of prime importance to meet with Buxtons fitters who had previously fitted carpets at the Pavilion in the Long Gallery in 1975 to discuss the practicality and tolerances of the design. This ensured all eventualities of fitting were considered. Installation was undertaken in 2018.

CARPET FITTERS

Buxtons have over 20 flooring and carpet fitters, many have been with them for several years. The longest serving is Stuart McPherson - 'Mac' who has been with them for 48 years. They also train and employ several apprentices, often the sons of long-standing fitters.


